REPORT OF THE COUNCIL REPORT - 1 1 8th A G M

The 118th Annual General Meeting of MGMI was held on 21st September 2024 at 03.30 P.M. at Williamson Magor Hall, Bengal Chamber of Commerce & Industry, Royal Exchange Building, 6, Netaji Subhas Road, Kolkata. The meeting was chaired by Dr B Veera Reddy, President, MGMI. The compere invited the dignitaries Dr B V Reddy, President, MGMI, Shri J P Goenka, Vice President, Ranajit Talapatra, Honorary Secretary and Dr P K Mandol, Honorary Treasurer, MGMI on the dais.

Shri Talapatra read out the names of the members who left for their heavenly abode during the last one year and 1-minute silence was observed for the departed souls of the following members:

Welcoming the members present, he mentioned that the year was very good for MGMI in membership drive with increase of around 180 life members, organization of a huge number of successful events in different parts of the country by MGMI and its chapters. In future there are plans to hold the Foundation Day lecture, Holland Memorial lecture, which could not be held this year, and other seminars.

Thereafter, the Secretary proceeded with the agenda of the meeting, major highlights of which are as follows.

- 1. The Council's report, Audited balance sheet and Statement of accounts for the year ending on 31/03/2024were adopted by voice vote.
- 2. M/s Jha & Co was reappointed the Institute's Auditor for the year 2023-24 with a remuneration of Rs of 15,000/-. The Secretary pointed out during registration, MGMI was originally documented as 'Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India'. But somehow in Income Tax documents and PAN card, the word 'The' has been prefixed to its name. To avoid conflict, it was decided in Council Meeting to henceforth use the original name (without 'The') other than in the bank deposit accounts due to change issues. The proposal was approved by the members present.
- 3. Shri Dr B Veera Reddy, President, MGMI delivered the presidential address. He welcomed the members, award winners and their families and thanked the office bearers, especially Sri Ranajit Talapatra and also Sri Prasanta Roy for their help during his tenure as President.
 - He appreciated the membership growth, revitalization and activities of some chapters of MGMI, while some are relatively inactive. He acknowledged the successful execution of the 10th Asian Mining Congress and Exhibition organized by the Institute. He extended heartfelt congratulations to the Honorary Editor and the Editorial Board for their dedication in taking out quality publictions. Dr Reddy offered his wholehearted support to the new team promising full cooperation, both as an active member and in his role as Past President to ensure collective success.
- 4. The secretary announced that Shri Jai Prakash Dwivedi would be the incoming President. Shri Dwivedi, in a virtual speech, thanked MGMI for selecting him and promised to work for advancement of the institute.
- 5. Thereafter, the report of the Board of Scrutineers on the Election of the Council Members for the years 2024-27 was presented by Shri J P Goenka, Chairman. He

read out the names of 9 successful candidates, which are – Prof. Bhabesh Chandra Sarkar, Dr Murari Prasad Roy, Dr Hemant Agarwal, Dr Chandra Sekhar Singh, Prof. Khanindra Pathak, Prof NetaiChandra Dey, Shri Ajit Singh Choudhary, Shri Deb Kumar Kundu, and Dr Rabi Narayan Patra. He told that only 433 votes were cast in the online election out of 2213 voters. The Secretary pointed out that now members can update their e-mails and Phone nos through an application developed in the MGMI website and informed that members have been repeatedly requested through mails, social media, etc., to update their particulars so that MGMI notices and deliverables reach them.

- The Secretary informed that in the last AGM held on 23rd September 2023 at Crystal Banquet of Taj City Centre, New Town, Kolkata (117th AGM) it was decided and approved that as the M&AoA of MGMI requires some modification / amendment considering changed scenario since last modifications, like e-voting and increased membership drive, a committee is to be formed to amend the M&AoA to include provisions of e-voting and to consider reviewing the membership qualification criteria hindering induction of new members from industry, among other old clauses that needed to be changed or deleted. Accordingly, a Committee was formed in the 904th Council Meeting held on 01st of September 2024. The Committee met on 4 occasions and deliberated on the issues. The 905th Council accepted the recommendations of the Committee related to e-voting and membership qualification and agreed to place it in the AGM. The proposal was presented in detail by Honorary Secretary on screen. A suggestion that there should be a provision of simultaneous paper voting for members who were not having e-mail id and not technologically savvy was intensely contested with justifications and it was decided that it was not feasible and against Company Act under which MGMI is incorporated. The recommendations of the Committee set up to review the MoA for suggesting - (i) modification in voting clauses like timeframe needed in e-voting process, (ii) qualification clauses for enlisting interested members working and associated with mining industry for long, but lacking requisite qualifications like engineering degree etc. was agreed to in the AGM.
- It was also proposed and unanimously decided that for further changes in MoA&Aa committee would be formed by the next Council and deliberated to make the document brief, meaningful and modern.
- Regarding MGMI Awards of Excellence, Honorary Secretary mentioned that as a few members of the Council felt that Geology and Metallurgy (being the founding

streams of MGMI) should have Awards specifically given in those fields, a committee was formed in the 902nd Council Meeting to look into this and suggest changes if needed.

The Committee recommended that from next year, there will be 4 categories of MGMI Awards of Excellence in consonance with the name of the Institute, as follows:

MGMI Award of Excellence for outstanding contribution in the Coal Mining Industry; MGMI Award of Excellence for outstanding contribution in Mining Industry other than Coal; MGMI Award of Excellence for outstanding contribution in any Branch of Earth Science and MGMI Award of Excellence-for outstanding contribution in the Metallurgical Industry;

The Committee also recommended that the fifth award, which is the "The Best Technical Paper Award" to be selected from the papers published in MGMI Transactions for every Calendar Year may be suspended till the MGMI Transactions are published regularly every year.

Accordingly, the 904th Council had agreed and recommended that the changes may be put forward to the AGM for final approval. The recommendations were unanimously accepted in the AGM for being applied from next year onwards

- The recommendations of the Judging Committees for 3 MGMI awards and medals for 2023-24 were announced and presented to the recipients by the President. The Students' Awards for 2022-23 were announced and the awards were presented by the President

The report of the 902nd Council Meeting (2nd meeting of the 118th Session) at MGMI Building, GN-38/4, Sector – V, Salt Lake, Kolkata – 700091 on Saturday 27th April 2024 at 3.00 p.m. (duly approved in the 903rd Council Meeting held on 22nd June 2024).

Present: Dr. B Veera Reddy, President in the Chair on Virtual. The meeting was attended by Prof Sakti Pada Banerjee, S/Shri R P Ritolia, R. K. ITEM No. 0 Opening of the Meeting

0.1 The President welcomed all those present physically and virtually in the meeting and granted leave of absence to those who could not be present. He congratulated the Council members of MGMI and thanked Shri JP Goenka for holding the Golf Tournament at RCGC, Kolkata successfully on 24th April 2024.

He also told that due to some unforeseen circumstances the Foundation Day. Lecture along with the 902nd Council Meeting (02nd Meeting of the 118th Session) could not be held at ECL, Hqs, Sanctoria, Asansol on 17th Feb, 2024 at 12:00 Noon.

He requested Honorary Secretary to start with the agenda of the meeting. Honorary Secretary thanked the President and proceeded with the meeting following the Agenda items.

902.1.0 To confirm the Minutes of the 901st meeting of the Council held in Hybrid platform at MGMI Hqs, Sector-V, Salt Lake, Kolkata on 3rd December, 2023 at 11:30am.

The Minutes of the 901st Council Meeting had been circulated via mail to all the Council Members and changes suggested by Honorary Editor, have been duly incorporated and shared with the 902nd Council Meeting Notice on 13.04.2024.

The Council resolved that:

902.1.1 To consider matters arising out of the Minutes.

The Honorary Secretary read out the ATR (Action Taken Report) in respect of the Minutes of the 901st Council meeting.

The Council considered the Action Taken Report in respect of the Minutes of 901stCouncil Meeting held on 3rd December, 2023 in Hybrid platform and concurred.

Events in the first 4 months of 2024 were discussed. MGMI Western / Nagpur Chapter organised a National Seminar on Artifical Intelligence in Mining (AIM) on 26.2.2024 at Sofitel, Mumbai. Secretary thanked Mr Thomas Cherian for taking the initiative and organising it at such a short time. Honorary Secretary also thanked Shri N N Gautam and MGMI Delhi Chapter for successfully organizing the 8th Round Table Conference on Coal on the theme - "Role of Coal in Energy Transition" in association with ISM Alumni Association and India Energy Forum on Friday, 12th April 2024 at Hotel Le Meridien, New Delhi.

Mr Cherian thanked the President for being the Chief Guest in AIM 24 and also the Honorary Secretary, especially for undertaking all efforts in helping to plan the theme & flow and organise the event in short time remotely from Kolkata, liaising with WCL Nagpur Chapter, pursuing for sponsorships and getting some of the speakers.

902.2.0 To review and consider the proposed Budget for the Council Year 2023 - 24 (Sept 2023 - Sept 2024).

The estimated budget for the FY 2023- 24 was placed before the council members for their review, consideration & approval.

The members discussed the matter at length and considered the proposed budget and it was passed by the Council for Council Year FY 2023-24 (Sep 23 - Sep 24).

902.3.0 To discuss about the future events of the Institute.

Honorary Secretary informed the Council Members that as per desire of President, the long pending Foundation Day Lecture) is proposed to be held in Asansol to be delivered by Chairman, DVC who had agreed for the lecture.

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Also, it was proposed by Honorary Secretary that Prof. (Dr.) Rajib Dey is named as the Convener of the Yearly Half Day Seminar that usually take place before AGM in Sept 2024. The AGM date was tentatively scheduled on Saturday, the 21st of September 2024.

902.4.0 To consider and constitute a Board of scrutineers to conduct the Election of Council Members for the year 2024-27.

He proposed a Committee for the above purpose comprising Shri J P Goenka, Shri V. K. Arora, Dr. Amalendu Sinha and Shri Prasanta Roy (Secretary as ex-officio member) and the Council Members concurred. It was suggested that as far as possible, the system of e-voting started in 2021 should be continued with the same agency CDSL which is well trusted all over the country.

902.5.0 To consider applications for membership and membership position of the Institute.

It was informed that a total of 33 applications were received for Life Membership out of which 1 was for upgradation from Annual Member.

It was pointed out that one membership application pertained to an Officer working in MCL as Manager (Public Relations), namely Shri Vinayak Dwarkanath Sharma Jamwal. The Council was requested to decide whether to accept his application for Life Membership as the Educational Qualification (B. Sc with Chemistry, Zoology & Botany followed by Master of Mass Communication, MBA in HR & Mktg and Advanced Diploma in MargketingMgmt) and experience (Not in Mining but as PRO in a Mining Company) was completely at variance with the Criteria of Qualification and Experience presently in MGMI MoA&AoA.

After detailed deliberation, it was decided by the Council that his application may be kept in abeyance and his money fully refunded with a polite explanation. His case will be taken up in the AGM after the Council places the recommendations of the committee set up for modifying and updating the AoA and its clauses.

902.6.0 Any other matter with the permission of the Chair.

- i. Secretary informed that in different documents of MGMI, the names are appearing differently. In Certificate of Registration under Companies Act, when the word "Metallurgical" was added to the namein 1937 and in Registration for Income Tax in 1984-85, it is "Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India", whereas in PAN Card documents and GST Registration it is "The Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India", which creates a mismatch that is flagged by the Online Payment Gateway Companies as it goes against the SOP of their verification process set up as per RBI mandate. He said that the CA and the Company Secretary both suggest ed a Council Resolution to change the name from "The Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India" in PAN and GST to "Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India". Accordingly, the 902nd MGMI Council resolved that
 - a) The name of the Organization, that is "Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India" or MGMI in common parlance may be corrected in the PAN

related documents as well as the GST documents other than bank accounts, and

- b) Honorary Secretary is empowered to sign on behalf of the Council and
- The Company Secretary and CA will be assigned with the responsibility of carrying out this job under guidance from Honorary Secretary, MGMI
- ii. Shri Prasanta Roy again raised the matter of reviewing the Awards of Excellence in that there should be a separate award for excellence in Geology, as MGMI was founded on Mining and Geology. The Award of Excellence for Earth Sciences will encompass Metallurgy, Ore Dressing / Mineral Processing and others.

The Council suggested that a committee may be constituted to have a re-look at these big awards. The names proposed were those of Shri N C Jha, Dr Amalendu Sinha, Prof Rajib Dey, Dr C S Singh and Shri Prasanta Roy.

Geology, Earth Science, Metallurgy, or equivalent degree, in case they applied or were interested.

Later, as per the advice of then President, MGMI, based on a telephonic call from senior Council Member who wanted to remain anonymous, the Committee recommendations was rescinded, revised and recommended to only change the clauses related to Eligibility and E-voting which were agreed in single point agenda in the 905th Council meeting. Regarding the other important changes in various clauses related to permanent invitees (without voting rights) in the Council as well as other clauses/phrases/words, as suggested by some Members in the Committee, then President advised that it may be taken up in the next session after the New Council is formed post AGM. To this, Dr Amalendu Sinha, who agreed with this advice, suggested that when the next Council meets, a committee may be constituted by the members of the Council which will exclude Past Presidents & Past Secretaries. The members present agreed to this proposal and recommended the changes recommended by the committee for being put up in the AGM. Accordingly, the recommended changes agreed by the Committee for placing in the AGM and proposal for review of the whole Memorandum and Articles of Association comprehensively, was placed in the 118th AGM held on 21.09.2024 and was agreed by the members present.

However, when the matter of constituting a committee for such purpose was taken as per earlier 905th council meeting resolution, there was a difference of opinion, and it was decided that it will be discussed in a later meeting.

Honorary Secretary reminded the Council about the Polish Embassy Visit to MGMI when Shri P M Prasad was the President during which a Training of Underground Mining was proposed through MGMI by GiG (Central Mining Institute), Katowice, Poland. Under the active guidance of Shri P M Prasad and later Dr B Veera Reddy, the matter was taken forward by Secretary as directed and Coal India approved the MGMI proposal of training in GiG, Katowice Poland for 50 of its Mining executives (in batches of 20, 20 and 10) organised by MGMI with MGMI having a share for facilitating and helping the process and concerned logistics. This was mentioned several times at Council Meetings, and other MGMI events by the immediate past President. This would expand MGMI's reach, impact and fame in a broader perspective, even internationally as desired in several Council meetings as well as form a basis of supplementing income, a winwin situation.

Since the last few months, Honorary Secretary has been working and interacting with GiG, Katowice and the Polish Embassy in designing the course and has been instrumental in creating & putting the proposal before Coal India, modifying as per CIL advice and smoothening out administrative, logistical and legal road-bumps in finalisation of the Contract Agreement between GiG and MGMI. The Contract Agreement is in the process of being finalised and signed by GiG and MGMI representatives.

Honorary Secretary requested the Council to allow him to sign on behalf of MGMI. Few of the Council Members advised that before this, the final agreement may be circulated among them. Secretary agreed to circulate the final draft with them before the next Council Meeting.

The report of the 907th Council Meeting (02nd Meeting of the 119th Session) at Taj Taal Kutir-Rose room, Eco Park, Kolkataon Friday, the 17th of January 2025 at 03:00 P.M. (duly approved in the 908th Council Meeting held on Saturday, the 31st of May 2025 at 02:30 P.M).

ITEM No. 0 Opening of the Meeting

- 0.6 Sri Ranajit Talapatra, Honorary Secretary welcomed all members present physically as well as virtually and requested the President, who was present in person, to call the "meeting to order" and address the Council Members.
- 0.2 The President welcomed all those present physically and virtually in the meeting and granted leave of absence to those who could not be present. The President also shared the news of press conference for upcoming 11th AMC & IME 2025 which as held on the same day just before the 907th Council Meeting at Rose Room, Taj Taal Kutir. He called the 'meeting to order' and requested the Honorary Secretary to take up the Agenda in sequence.
- 0.3 The Honorary Secretary requested Shri I P Wadhwa, Managing Worker, Tafcon to sharethe progress of IME to the Council members at the meeting. Shri I P Wadhwa informed that the Biswa Bangla Mela Ground & Science City grounds have been booked for the exhibition after discussions with concerned high officials and getting permission from the State Govt. When questioned about the mode of transport between

the 2 exhibition sites across the road, it was informed that abundant number of suitable vehicles will be arranged for travelling to and fro at regular short intervals and there would be no problem as such that could be foreseen. He said that the council would be apprised of further developments after two months. As his presentation of the status of IME was complete, he excused himself from the meeting which was agreed by the members.

The Honorary Secretary also informed the Council that the MoU between Tafcon and MGMI for the upcoming 11th AMC 2025 will be signed wherein the minimum guarantee amount has been increased as per standard protocol to 10% amounting to Rs. 60.5 Lakhs plus 18% GST and further TAFCON will contribute to MGMI a sum of Rs.1243/- per sqm. of the net booked exhibition area inside the hall and Rs. 809/-per sqm. of net exhibition space booked outside the hall. The Council agreed to the said MoU.

The Honorary Secretary thanked Mr. Wadhwa and welcomed all the council members in the meeting and started the meeting as per the agenda.

907.1.1 To consider matters arising out of the Minutes.

The Honorary Secretary read out the ATR (Action Taken Report) in respect of the Minutes of the 906th Council meeting.

The Honorary Secretary informed that due to non-availability of Shri Kamath, Secretary, or a suitable speaker matching up to the high standards of MGMI Foundation Day Lectures, the Foundation Day Lecture is kept in abeyance for the time being. He also shared the reasons for holding the upcoming 11th Asian Mining Congress, 2025 for two days and at JW Marriott, Kolkata.

The Council considered the Action Taken Report in respect of the Minutes of 906th Council Meeting and agreed.

The Honorary Secretary highlighted that there are two major events coming up:

i. The 11th Asian Mining Congress 2025

He requested the Chairman of Technical Committee, Dr. Amalendu Sinha to share the progress of the 1st Technical Committee meeting of the 11th AMC 2025 that was held in hybrid platform on 11th Jan 2025. Dr. Sinha highlighted the formation of the Committee

comprising of stalwarts from different sectors like mining, research institutes and professors. He talked about the draft of the brochure of 11th AMC being further modified following discussions in the 1st Technical Committee meeting and was sent to MGMI for going to Press. For submission of papers the last date is fixed on 15th May, 2025 and sufficient time will be given to Authors for making any changes. He also informed that the Technical Committee is trying its best to have the Proceedings volume published through Springer Publications. The theme of the Congress for 11th AMC is "Innovative & Responsible Mining for Inclusive Growth" which was discussed during the Technical Committee meeting and finalised. 19TH FOUNDATION DAY LECTURE

The 19th Foundation Day Lecture of the Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India (MGMI) was delivered by Shri S. Suresh Kumar, IAS, Chairman, Damodar Valley Corporation at Dishergarh Club, Sanctoria, Eastern Coalfields Limited on 15th June

2024. The Guest of Honour at the event was Shri P.M. Prasad, Chairman Coal India Limited. Other guests on the dais were Dr B.V. Reddy, Dir (Tech), CIL & President, MGMI, Shri Ranajit Talapatra, Honorary Secretary, MGMI, Dr. C.S. Singh, Honorary Joint Secretary, MGMI, Shri Niladri Ray, Director (Tech), ECL and Chairman, Asansol Chapter and Shri Samiran Dutta, CMD, ECL.

At the outset, Shri Kumar thanked MGMI for inviting him to deliver the 19th Foundation Day Lecture. His topic of discussions was 'Repurposing of Coal Mines for a Just Transition'. The Government of India has identified as many as 299 mines as abandoned, discontinued and closed. These mines are presently occupying large parcels of land that remain unused. By 2070, India's target to achieving net zero - India will require three times more energy than it did in 2019. Achieving the Renewable Energy (RE) targets will require acquisition of large tracts of land. Utilization of land associated with abandoned mines, for repurposing can support realization of RE targets and other commercially viable business models. With proper planning and investment, these lands can be repurposed for a variety of applications, such as renewable energy development, data centre development, agriculture, and recreation, among others. Repurposing of closed mines is also an enabler of "Just Transition", a concept which has been around since the 1980s. In recent years, the concept has gained traction with reference to meeting climate goals by ensuring the whole of society - all communities, all workers, all social groups – are brought along in the pivot to a net zero future. Just transition is even more important since the coal sector is deeply interconnected, not only to other sectors, but also to the local communities. Coal in India occurs in states which are economically disadvantaged. If done right, the transition offers immense opportunities: systems change in which all communities, workers, and countries are lifted up.

Shri Kumar continued his deliberations on 'Repurposing Business Models' under a few subheads.

- i. Underground Pump Storage System In response to reducing carbon emissions, many countries are currently undergoing an energy transition to mitigate their environmental impact with a growing reliance on renewable energy sources like solar and wind power, which exhibit great variability. Consequently, to address the challenge of temporal matching between energy supply and demand, various energy storage technologies have emerged as potential solutions such as pumped-storage hydroelectricity (PSH) representing 99% of global storage capacity. Underground Pumped Storage Power Plants (UPSP), as first introduced in the early 20th century, offer a viable solution that capitalizes on the utilization of abandoned underground spaces and effectively circumvents topographical constraints and limitations associated with surface footprint.
- Solar PV Floating solar PV panels at flooded open pits are an option under active consideration. Former lignite open cast mines are also good locations for

- FPV since a connection to the grid already exists as a rule. If anchoring on land is not possible, then a conventional ship MGMI News Journal, Vol. 50, No. 1 / April June, 2024 28 anchor can be used. However, this can lead to additional costs, which depend on the pit depth.
- iii. Gravitational Energy Using Mine Shafts Gravity-based energy storage devices involve the use of heavy weights that may be raised when there is surplus renewable energy generation, likely to be from solar or wind power. The weights are lowered in a shaft to generate power when there is a deficit. Potential energy is thus converted to electricity on demand. The concept is to adapt a disused mine shaft to raise and lower weights connected to an electric motor that also acts as a generator. An existing vertical shaft avoids the need to build a structure above or below ground.
- iv. Hydrogen Storage in Mine Shaft Vessels There is international interest in the use of hydrogen (H2) as a decarbonised fuel system; the significance of hydrogen is that it can be produced using renewable electricity that provides a unique form of chemical energy that can be used in a similar way to fossil fuels. Gravitricity is initially focused on the development of gravitational energy storage, but there is an alternative energy storage concept for hydrogen in mines. An attractive option may be to reuse coal mine shafts, inserting vessels where a lined shaft wall provides part of the containment system.
- v. Dumping of ash As it is well known, evacuation of ash from thermal power plants is a major problem. A larger number of abandoned mines should be made available to power producers for sustainable generation. Infact, it is proposed that Fuel Supply Agreements (FSAs) must include an assurance of allotment of abandoned mines by the supplying entity for dumping ash of a concomitant quantity considering ash content of the supplied Grade of Coal.
- vi. Geothermal Energy Another option for the use of old mine workings is to extract warm water present in them for use in nearby district heating schemes. The warm water is due to the geothermal gradient in the earth's crust, such that for each kilometer the temperature rises by about 25°C.
- vii. Batteries Batteries require little other infrastructure but do occupy a large area. The use of mines could mean substantial savings compared to conventional hydro projects requiring tunneling.
- viii. Small Modular Reactors (SMRs) SMRs can be defined as nuclear reactors with a power output of up to and around 300 MWe that incorporate by design higher safety, modularisation, standardisation. Today, more than 70 concepts are under development covering a wide range of technology approaches and maturity levels. They are claimed to have great advantages in terms of safety through increased use of smart innovative technology and inherent safety features.

- ix. Nature Recovery There is also the opportunity to restore the landscape by establishing forests, wetlands and parkland. This is especially the case where sites are remote from population centres and where extensive shallow underground works pose risks of subsidence.
- x. Data Centres Data centers are the engines of the digital economy, and their development, powered by renewable energy, on former mine sites is a focus of this study. Mines offer reclaimed land and the electrical infrastructure to support data centre needs. Then Shri Kumar discussed benefits of repurposing, concluding the breadth of options for repurposing former coal sites is truly extensive. Many of these projects are just coming off the drawing board.

NATIONAL SEMINAR AMPG 2024

Mining, Geological & Metallurgical Institute of India (MGMI) organized a National Seminar on 'Augmentation in Metal Production: Journey Towards Green' (AMPG-2024) on 21st September 2024. It was held at Williamson Magor Hall, Bengal Chamber of Commerce & Industry, Royal Exchange Building, 6, Netaji Subhas Road, Kolkata. The event was arranged in two sessions – inaugural and a technical session.

Inaugural Session

The session commenced with the compere welcoming the guests, delegates and participants with a brief introduction of MGMI and inviting Shri P M Prasad, Chairman, Coal India Limited (CIL) and Chief Guest of the event, Shri Brijendra Pratap Singh, Director-in-Charge, DSP & IISCOSAIL, Guest of Honour, Dr B Veera Reddy, President, MGMI, Dr Rajib Dey, Convenor, AMPG, Shri Ranajit Talapatra, Honorary Secretary on the dais. Shri Sanjiv Kumar Singh, Director (Mining), Hindustan Copper Ltd, Guest of Honour, could not attend the inaugural session for unforeseen circumstances.

Dr Rajib Dey welcomed the guests and delegates. Introducing the theme of the seminar, he mentioned that metals are gaining importance of which steel is the most. The per capita production of steel in India is well below the world average and we need to increase the production capacity. Besides, for production of electrical vehicles, lithium, cobalt, nickel are required. The enhancement of production of metals is a necessity, but the mining and extraction is not an environment-friendly process, Dr Dey mentioned. Steel production accounts for 10%-12% of total global emission. Our aim should be to make the metal production process environment-friendly and sustainable as also cost-effective. The aim of the seminar was to discuss ways of metal production in a much greener way.

Dr B Veera Reddy mentioned the topic on metal mining is a different one from the topics of the 10- 12 seminars conducted by MGMI in last few years. Since steel production needs to be doubled to 300 mt by 2030 and to 500 mt by 2047, Ministry of Coal has enhanced the target of coking coal production. Metal extraction (bauxite to aluminium)

and preparation (steel) are power-intensive processes and we should try to find some energy-efficient measures for going green. Recycling of metals needs less energy. Coal India has taken a lot of environment initiatives. He feels lot of exploration needs to be done in our country. For growth of country's economy, growth of metal industry is a necessity. He concluded by mentioning that the topic is very apt and by wishing the seminar a success from which knowledgeable inputs would hopefully come out.

Shri Brijendra Pratap Singh began his address by commenting that MGMI is actively involved in exchanging knowledge on mineral and metal industry and in taking role in collaboration between industry leaders, technology suppliers, power centres and policy makers. According to him the topic of seminar is very apt in the current scenario. India's economy is growing @ 6-7%. For the mission 'Viksit Bharat 2047', Indian Government is putting thrust on infrastructure development and capital investment and for this, consumption of metal is set to increase. Shri Singh spoke on Government of India's National Steel Policy framed in 2017 that states per capita demand to increase; indigenous production of high strength, value added steel to minimise import; sustainability; reducing CO2 emission. All steel majors are planning to intro- MGMI News Journal, Vol. 50, No. 2 / July - September, 2024 96 duce new technologies in their expansion plan. He urged that coal companies may increase supply of low-ash coking coals to curb imports. Iron ores in India are mostly of low grade and improved beneficiation technology is a necessity. He emphasized on metal scrap recycling. Shri Singh concluded by suggesting alternative fuels and ways to reduce CO2 emission in steel production.

Shri P M Prasad told sustainable mining practices are the need of the day, whether it is coal mining or metal mining. Coking coals are a basic need for steel industry and to lower the price of steel, availability of coking coal at low cost is required. After a long time, dedicated coking coal mine, like Kotre-Basantpur (West Bokaro Coalfield), is coming up in the country. Coals from this mine, after washing, would be of good quality. Keeping eye towards sustainability, mining equipment are being designed, as also high efficiency, low emission power plants. Mine closure plans are being modified with technical assistance from World Bank. Shri Prasad concluded by wishing the seminar a success.

Shri Sanjiv Kumar Singh, who could reach nearing the end of the session talked of HCL, the only copper miner of the nation, mining and processing copper concentrate. India has only 0.3% of world copper reserve. He mentioned a few steps that HCL is planning to take for expansionincoming 5 years. The session concluded with presentation of mementoes to the dignitaries. The event was attended by 121 dignitaries, delegates and invitees.

Technical Session

The Chairman of the session was Prof N R Bandyopadhyay, Ex-Director, School of Material Science and Technology, IIEST Shibpur. Dr Rajib Dey introduced him. The Cochairman was Shri Pradip Kumar Thakur, Ex-Senior General Manager, CET, SAIL,

who was introduced by the Chairman. With a few introductory words, the chairman called the following speakers for presentation. Shri Tirtha Prasad Saptoka, Senior Area manager, Corporate Sustainability, Tata Steel spoke on 'Decarbonizing Steel making' after being introduced by Dr Rajib Dey. He told global risk landscape is dominated by sustainability risks. 2.5-3.0 gegatons of CO2 is emitted every year in India, of which 30% is from steel, cement and other metal industries. Steel is a permanent recyclable material, whose demand and production will grow. Challenges for decarbonization are – capital intensive assets, net zero technology, infrastructure development, varying regulation, willingness of customer to bear higher price. Then he discussed transition towards net zero, green route and plans and progress of Tata Steel.

Shri Subharthi Das, General Manager presented the paper of Arunava Banerjee, Chief Operating Officer, Primetals Technologies India entitled 'Primetals Solution for Suatainability in Steel Industry'. He suggested there are technologies like hydrogen-based one, to reduce pollution in steel industry, but buyers need to be ready to purchase those. He discussed Maximized Emission Reduction of Sintering (MEROS), Waste Heat Recovery (WHR) for Electric Earth Furnace, Automation systems popular in Europe.

Shri Rajib Maitra, Partner, Mining & Metals, Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu India LLP, talked on 'Augmenting Copper Sector Growth in India'. He mentioned copper is a critical mineral almost globally, presenting global demand scenario, supply scenario, leading producers of copper concentrate across major copper economies. There are global initiatives on producing low-carbon copper. He discussed usage segments in India, its resource position which is 12.20 Mt. Recent thrust in exploration activities in onshore and offshore areas is on. Then he spoke about major producers in our country, recycling of the metal, projected demands and productions by 2030 and 2047, which may grow 5 to 6 times. He felt Government should take initiatives for growth of copper industry. The topic of discussions of Dr Ranjeet Kumar Singh, Principal Scientist, Mineral Processing Division, CSIR-NML was 'Augmentation of Iron Ore Resources'. He talked of production, consumption and future demand of steel, mentioning good quality raw material and processes involving reduced energy consumption and carbon emission needed for achievement. The steps for augmentation, challenges of beneficiation were discussed. He concluded by presenting a few case studies and beneficiation strategy.

Shri Sam N Mitra, Director, Tuffstone Resources Pvt Ltdand Former VP (Minerals), Tata International Ltd delivered presentation on 'Productivity and Prosperity in Mining Industry'. He felt key themes linked to productivity are augmentation, atmanirbhar and green mining and discussed productive technology mentioning that depletion is the biggest threat in mining industry. He quoted a FICCI-Deloitte report that said less than 10% of India's Obvious Geological Potential (OGP) has been explored yet and less than 2% has been presently mined, and concluded that we could be selfreliant only through cost-competitiveness, and not by merely having large reserves.

Shri Anirban Biswas, Sr Principal Engineer, Project Management, M N Dastur & Co (P) Ltd, spoke on 'Possibility of Production of Green Steel in India'. He presented production and consumption figures of different types of steel and iron. According to him the green path to steel production. is dependent on – energy efficiency, use of renewable energy, material efficiency, green hydrogen, CCUS. Steel and Iron industries emit 12% of total CO2 emission. He discussed cleaner technologies and some innovative methods explored by various entrepreneurs towards and major challenges for production of green steel.
